From the Study Galatians 5:22-23 (ESV)

22 But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law.

When we talk about Spiritual fruit we need to first realise that Paul does not give us a list of different possible fruits. The word interpreted 'fruit' here is singular, thus referring to one fruit, but, at the same time all these attributes together make up this one fruit. It's a bit like biting into a fruit and finding it crunchy on the outside, but soft and sweet on the inside; many attributes, but still one fruit. The same is true of the 'fruit of the Spirit', one Holy Spirit, several attributes; yet, without all these attributes, 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control,' the fruit is not whole, it is incomplete.

We cannot cherry pick which attributes we want, it's not a pick'n mix bag of goodies; as children of God, filled with His Spirit we should be producing fruit in keeping with His grace. If we do not exhibit all of these attributes, 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control,' we cannot claim to be filled with the Holy Spirit - missing one is the same as missing them all.

Paul also says, "against such things there is no law." it's important to note that Paul isn't talking about Civil Law, he's referring to Mosaic Law, which we find in the Old Testament. These attributes of the Holy Spirit are attributes of 'grace'; we are not saved by the law, but by grace, in that, 'God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.' (Romans 5:8)



We'll be celebrating the difference we can all make when we choose Fairtrade and campaign as part of a UK-wide movement calling for a fairer system behind the things we consume every day. With the world in a tailspin, fairness isn't a given. But the power to get there is in our hands. Together, our actions can have a positive impact on real people's lives.

Fairer pay. Fairer treatment. Fairer futures.

That's Fairtrade. It's not just a label - it's a movement.

So, whatever you do, and however you do it: Do it Fair.

What can you do during Fairtrade Fortnight?

Choose Fairtrade products:

People are at the heart of Fairtrade. There are over 1.9 million farmers and workers across more than 71 countries participating in Fairtrade.

Here's more about the people working with Fairtrade:

Banana farmers and workers

Bananas are grown both on small family farms and much larger commercial farms. The banana industry provides employment for thousands of people in Latin America, the Caribbean, Southeast Asia, and West Africa. Challenges include rising costs of production and changing weather patterns, amongst many more.

Bananas carrying the **FAIRTRADE** Mark have been produced by small farmer organisations or plantations that meet the Fairtrade social, economic and environmental standards. The standards include protection of workers' rights and the environment and payment of the Fairtrade Minimum Price and an additional Fairtrade Premium to invest in business or community.

origin. Workers may face low wages, long working hours and a difficult relationship with estate management. Often it is the management they depend on for basic needs such as housing, healthcare, access to water and even education for their children.

Sugar farmers

Around 80 per cent of the world's sugar is derived from sugar cane, grown by millions of small-scale farmers and workers.

It is one of the most valuable agricultural commodities, and for many countries, sugar is one of the most important sources of national income. For example, sugar accounts for 70 per cent of the value of Cuba's exports and 40 per cent of exports from Belize.

Tea farmers and workers

Tea is the most popular drink in the world after water – an estimated 70,000 cups are drunk every second. Tea farming communities however, face serious challenges.

One in four children in Kenya's tea & coffee growing regions are malnourished, leading to stunted growth. One in 10 children in the teagrowing regions of Malawi die before their fifth birthday.

Tea is produced on large plantations or estates and picked by employed workers. It is also grown on small plots of land by small-scale farmers who sell their freshly-plucked green leaf to plantations or tea factories for processing into black tea. In Africa, the average small-scale farmer's farm is less than half the size of a football pitch. Tea farmers face the challenge of low and fluctuating prices for the green leaf they sell, and a lack of power in a tea supply chain dominated by large companies.

On tea estates, the challenges for workers vary depending on the

Cocoa farmers

Chocolate is one of the UK's favourite foods. The farmers growing cocoa however, do not reap the rewards of its popularity, with many experiencing extreme poverty. Millions of cocoa farmers work extremely hard under gruelling conditions, yet do not earn a living income. On average, cocoa farmers earn just 6% of the final value of a bar of chocolate.

When terms of trade don't work for cocoa farmers it exacerbates poverty and contributes to persistent problems like discrimination, exploitation and deforestation, which threaten the future of cocoa farming communities and the future of cocoa itself.

Coffee farmers

Coffee is one of the world's most popular beverages and 80% of it is produced by 25 million smallholders.

Coffee is well known for being a boom and bust commodity. Global coffee production varies from year to year according to weather conditions, disease and other factors, resulting in a coffee market that is inherently unstable and characterised by wide fluctuations in price. This price volatility has significant consequences for those who depend on coffee for their livelihood, making it difficult for growers to predict their income for the coming season and budget for their household and farming needs.

Cotton farmers

Cotton is the world's oldest commercial crop and one of the most important fibre crops in the global textile industry.

Cotton farmers in lower income countries, including leading producers like India and China, live in hardship. As many as a IOO million rural households – 90% of them in lower income countries – are directly engaged in cotton production, relying on it for their income. An estimated 350 million people work in the cotton sector when family labour, farm labour and workers in connected services such as transportation, ginning, baling and storage are taken into account. For farmers, the challenges range from the impact of climate change, poor prices for seed cotton, through to competition from highly subsidised producers in rich countries and poor terms of trade. In particular, government subsidies for cotton farmers in rich countries, particularly the US, create a market with artificially low prices that small-scale farmers are unable to compete in.

Flower farmers and workers

The cut flower trade is now a major industry in both developing and developed countries, with global trade estimated to be worth more than £88 billion a year.

It's increasingly important to the economies of countries disadvantaged by unfair global trade structures. The flower trade also brings in foreign exchange for investment in economic development. For example,

Kenya's flower industry provides vital income for up to two million people.

However, the flower industry's largely female workforce often face limited access to education, over-crowded housing, low wages and repression of trade unions.

Wine farmers and workers

Wine is produced in over 50 countries around the world and is one of the world's most well-known and popular beverages.

Wine grape farming and wine-making are time-consuming industries, strenuous and labour-intensive. The demanding processes involved in the production of wine often lead to poor labour standards and living conditions for both small wine grape farmers and hired labourers on large plantations.

Fairtrade Standards are designed to improve employment conditions and protect the rights of workers on wine grape plantations and to support small wine grape farmers' organisations in gaining more control within supply chains and increase their incomes. There are 38 Fairtrade wine producer organisations worldwide, across South Africa, Chile and Argentina, representing more than 5,440 farmers and workers.

South Africa is the largest producer of Fairtrade wine globally, with 24 and Chile has 9 producer organisations.
